the gift, but it is up to each person to either take or reject that gift. Nicodemus was given that gift opportunity and received it.

Some people spend their whole life trying to work their way to heaven. The Bible clearly tells us there is nothing we can do; there are never enough good things we can do to have our sin forgiven. I John 1:9 says if we confess or tell God we have sinned and ask Him to forgive us, God will do that and we are then forgiven and made clean from all we have ever done. Discussion:

- Why did Nicodemus have so much difficulty understanding what Jesus was trying to teach him?
- If doing good deeds would be the way to heaven, how many good deeds would a person have to do? How good is good enough?
- What religious system, other than Christianity, can you think of where a person only has to have faith to have access to heaven?
- If your life ended today, where would you be in your relationship with God? Would you already be part of God's family?
- Why do you think Nicodemus came to Jesus at night?
- After reading these stories, do you now think differently about God?

The rise of Biblical illiteracy in America

Dr. R. Albert Mohler, Jr., the ninth president of The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary wrote in 2005 regarding the issue of biblical illiteracy, " Researchers George Gallup and Jim Castelli put the problem squarely: 'Americans revere the Bible--but, by and large, they don't read it. And because they don't read it, they have become a nation of biblical illiterates.' Researchers tell us that it's worse than most could imagine.

- Fewer than half of all adults can name the four gospels.
- Many Christians cannot identify more than two or three of the disciples.
- According to Barna Research Group, 60 percent of Americans can't name even five of the Ten Commandments. 'No wonder people break the Ten Commandments all the time. They don't know what they are,' said George Barna, president of the firm.
- 82 percent of Americans believe "God helps those who help themselves" is a Bible verse
- 12 percent of adults believe that Joan of Arc was Noah's wife
- A survey of graduating high school seniors revealed that over 50 percent thought that Sodom and Gomorrah were husband and wife
- A considerable number of respondents to one poll indicated that the Sermon on the Mount was preached by Billy Graham

Many thousands of years ago a scenario was played out. Review with me the words from the book of Judges, chapter 2, verse 10: *"After a whole generation had been gathered to their fathers, another generation grew up, who knew neither the Lord nor what*

He had done for Israel. The Israelites did evil in the eyes of the Lord.”

The struggle between good and evil has been present even before recorded history and the creation of the world. We read that this struggle and conflict existed long before creation in the heavenlies when war broke out between Satan and his angel followers and God Himself. That story alone would be sufficient for a remake of Star Wars with special effects that could also mesmerize audiences.

The world remains in jeopardy with a generation that will “*know neither the Lord nor what He had done for Israel.*” And the result will be similar, “*The Israelites did evil in the eyes of the Lord.*”

Without a spiritual moral compass the world indeed is doomed to a falling away from biblical principles of living. Is there any doubt that there is a need and urgency for telling the Biblical Story?

The verses in the book of Judges is a reminder of a similar fate our world is facing today, the need for a better society, a better world, hope for a better future, and rescue from a dark side of mankind. Those of us who know the message of the Bible, know where that hope lies. But we are living today in a world where the “dark side’ would have us forget God, forget His Word and soon forget the principles of living that are embodied in those sacred writings.

when he stated those who have established their faith in Christ become part of God’s families and are “*heirs of God.*” Paul makes it clear that only those who have established this type of faith are those heirs, this is not a blanket kinship of all mankind.

This is the very pivotal point of all faith systems, how we become justified or right with God. For those who do not know the living God, their faith is based on following rules, doing good deeds, on works of prayers and sacrifices, always trying to win their god’s favor. The Bible clearly tells us there is nothing we can do ourselves to make ourselves “right” with God, it is not what we do it is what God has already done when He gave His only Son, Christ, as the payment for our sin or rebellion against God. The acceptance of that gift from God is what places us in God’s family and assures us of eternity in heaven. (John 14:2)

Once we make this faith commitment and establish that relationship, we become adopted sons and daughters of God; we become part of His family.

It all seems so easy but it is amazing how many people never believe in Christ and accept God’s gift and consequently never become part of God’s family. And some ask how a loving God could condemn people to an eternity outside of heaven. Yet it is not God who makes this choice, it is man. God has already given

We know from further scripture passages that Nicodemus finally “got it” and became a believer, even later defending Jesus before other religious leaders who were attacking Jesus and His teaching. (John 7:50, 51)

When we acknowledge our sin condition, recognize the gift that God gave us in Christ as the sacrifice for our sin and ask God to forgive us, God forgives us. It is just like starting our life all over again – we are “born again,” but this time we are born into God’s family. (1 John 1:9)

In the very beginning God created Adam and Eve and at the same time established the concept of family. God’s concept of family permeates all scripture and is shown later in clans and tribes and in numerous Old Testament illustrations and later with Jesus in His teachings. Jesus talked often about all of us becoming a child of God, another example of family.

This helps us to understand the spiritual aspect of family and how God desires all of us to become children in His family. That relationship is not automatic as is clearly indicated in Jesus’ teachings. All life spiritual paths do not lead to the same God as many would have us believe. Jesus said He was the way, the truth and the life and that no one would come to the Father except through Him. He could not make this any clearer. In the book of Romans, chapter 8, the Apostle Paul refers to this relationship

Jesus final instructions to all of us

As Jesus gathered His followers on the hill before He ascended into Heaven, He gave specific last instructions. This is what He said: *“Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.”*

Matthew 28:19, 20

Tell-A-Story: Telling others is teaching the Story of God and it is so easy. Become familiar with just the 12 stories in this booklet by reading them over to yourself several times. Consider taking this on as a personal learning project and in just a week or two familiarize yourself with just one story a day, reading it in the morning and evening or when you have some extra time. Think on the questions and begin developing your own additional questions for discussion with another person about each story.

Discover story sharing as a way to tell other people about God. Everyone loves to hear and tell stories. We do this every day in our interactions with others. Use this interest in storytelling to share with others what you will discover as the personal joy of sharing the Story of God with others. Just ask someone, *“Can I tell you a story?”* They will usually say, “Yes”. THAT! is your moment of opportunity to begin sharing the Story of God.

Show them the Bible story symbols on page 14 in this book and ask them which story they would like to hear. When they select, tell them that story. When you finish ask the person, “What did you find interesting about that story?” Use the other discussion starters and questions listed at the end of each story. Just ask questions and let others discover story treasures for themselves. Then wait and see if they ask to hear another story and continue telling as long as they are interested in listening. Let them take the lead to tell you if they want to hear more.

Some may want to hear only one story while others may want to hear them all. Only keep telling as long as they are interested. Sometimes people will ask you later to tell them another story. Let God use you to tell others His story according to their interest and attention.

Becoming Part of God's Family

Scripture: John 3:1-18

Passage for memorization and Biblical telling: John 3:1-18

A very religious man by the name of Nicodemus came to Jesus very late one night. He asked Jesus how he could become part of the Kingdom of God, essentially part of God's family. Jesus said that everyone who wants to be part of God's family must be born again. If you remember that story, Nicodemus did not understand this. He asked Jesus how anyone could go back and be born all over again. It sounded preposterous to Nicodemus that a person could be born again like a newborn baby.

Jesus then went on to describe to Nicodemus that a person needs to be born physically and also spiritually. Jesus added that this was a spiritual concept and told Nicodemus that since he was not even open to understanding earthly things Jesus had taught how could he possibly grasp these spiritual concepts. It was not that difficult but Nicodemus was so wrapped up in the law and being religious he was blinded to this truth that Jesus was trying to teach him.

Teaching Others to Tell the Story of God

Training others in the Bible storytelling approach is not that difficult. If you have taught anyone in a class in the past you can easily do this. Make your training session fun and just get everyone to relax. This training progression can even help the most timid person build confidence for telling others the Story and stories of God.

Promote that you are going to have a storytelling workshop. People love storytelling and it seldom is difficult to get people to sign up for this kind of workshop. Your workshop time will be about 1 ½ hours.

Telling a Bible story: For effective learning of Bible stories when the story is first introduced the story should be told in at least two ways with a follow up discussion time after the second telling. Use a variety of storytelling techniques to make the telling time an exciting and memorable learning experience. This is the CBS4Kids approach of Bible storytelling and it also works well with adults. I like getting people involved right away in the storytelling process.

The training session is in eight segments:

1. Welcome and opening., Plan an ice breaker activity to get everyone in the session to relax and get to know others. There are many ice breaker activities listed on the internet. Just find one that seems like fun and use it.

2. First telling: Select a story from his book to use for this workshop. If you are the workshop leader, prepare your story well. Read it over several times. Become very familiar with the story details. Read and reread the story in the Bible selection listed.

After the ice breaker activity the leader tells the story with expression. Make sure you know the story. Tell the story without notes. Begin with your Bible in your hand, stating the story title and where in the Bible it is found. Lay your Bible aside (do NOT lay your Bible on the ground or floor) and tell the story. When you have completed the story, pick up your Bible and say “That is the story of _____” and close your Bible

3. Now, retell that same story but this time get members from your session involved. Tell the group you need volunteers and say they will have no speaking parts. That encourages people to respond.

Discussion

- What reactions do you have about many who recently have predicted the end of the world and spent millions of dollars to announce their predictions?
- Do you think the nations of the world are expecting Christ to return?
- Why do you think in God’s plan for the world He has not given a clear time frame for Christ to return to earth?
- Why the big secret that even the angles do not know?
- What world conditions can you think of that point toward Christ’s soon return?
- How do we prepare today for the return of Christ?

was getting close for His return. Then Jesus added there would be major earthquakes and other natural disasters and great famines where people could not get enough food. These would also be signs that the end of the world was getting close.

People all over the world would also grow in their hate for Christians and many Christians would be killed for their belief in Christ. We know that in certain countries today many people persecute Christians and make every attempt to destroy them.

Jesus also said some who say they are Christians will turn away from their faith and following God and some will even go against those who once were their friends and believe in Christ. This would be another sign that the end of the world was getting close.

Jesus added that many religious leaders will tell people lies about God and will convince people to believe things that are false. That is a primary reason why we must know what the Bible says so we know what is truth. If you want to get a good understanding of these things regarding end times read Matthew 24.

Yet Jesus said that no one, not even the angels of heaven know the time or date that He will return. This should inspire us to be prepared for His return at any moment. And while we are waiting, that does not mean resting on the back deck, it means daily living out our faith and being ready for Christ's return. In Matthew 25:1-13 there is a good description of those who are prepared for Christ, the Bride of the Church (Christ) to return and about those who are not prepared.

Select the number of people you need for whatever story you are telling (list of characters), assign character parts and ask them to pantomime the story as you tell it. Let them pantomime center stage as you tell the story from the side. Plan out your story in sections and give pause between story sections so those pantomiming can act out the segment.

4. Third telling: This is an important step as this step begins to release those in the session to feel comfortable participating in a telling experience.

Have all the workshop participants form groups of 3-5 right near where they are seated. No more than 5 in a group. In the safety where participants are in small groups of 3-5, this exercise reduces inhibitions as there is little pressure. The noise of everyone telling at once helps to break many storytelling barriers and fears.

Say to the group, **“Now, in your groups, when I say “Go” tell this same story I just told you to each other and try not to miss any of the story details. Take your time and everyone tell the story.”**

Give the groups 10-15 minutes where they tell the same story you have just told twice to the others in the group.

5. Fourth telling: Now call the workshop class back together.

Ask if someone would volunteer to stand right where they are and retell that same story to the entire workshop. You will almost always get someone who will volunteer. (A good technique to use to identify potential tellers is to move around the room while the telling is happening in the small break out groups and notice those who seem the most confident in telling.) If no one volunteers then ask from those you have identified if they would be willing to just tell that story.

6. Story Checking: This is where effective Bible storytelling happens. In this workshop segment you now ask the group to help you determine the accuracy of the story. The story has now been told more than four times.

Discuss with the group the importance of Bible storytelling accuracy. Ask the group these questions:

- From any of the telling times did you notice any story facts that were not accurate? If so, what inaccuracies did you notice.
- (as each inaccuracy is cited ask) How important was that fact to the integrity of the story?
- If that inaccuracy were told in a group who never had heard that Bible story before how do you think that could impact them? What misimpression might they walk away with?

Jesus Will Return

Scripture: Matthew 24, Revelation 21



Can you recall predictions in recent years regarding the end of the world? Did you ever hear someone say Jesus is coming back to earth next week or on a certain date? If you did, don't believe it. The Bible is very clear that no one, not even Jesus Himself knows when He is coming back to earth. Only God, the heavenly Father knows the time and day. But, while we are waiting God has a job for us to do. God wants us to be about living out our Christian faith and telling others about Christ.

One day Jesus was with His disciples sitting on the Mount of Olives when He reminded His disciples that a time would come when the world would end and God would make a new heaven and a new earth. The disciples asked Jesus when these things would happen.

Jesus told them even He did not know the day or time but that certain things would occur that would be signs that the end of the present world was coming. First, Jesus said that many people would come and say they were the real Son of God. If you hear someone say this do not believe him or her. When Jesus returns to earth God will announce it and everyone living will know for sure it is the real Christ returning. The Bible makes that very clear.

Jesus also said there would be constant news about wars happening around the world. This would be a sign that the time

- What can we do to insure that we “get the story straight” before we ever tell it?

7. Story Discovery: Every Bible story has a “truth” or life principle that God wants us to learn or know. It is important that as storytellers that we do not give the listener the answer, rather we guide the listener to discover the Bible truth for themselves.

Use the questions from the end of the story you used and ask the workshop class those same questions. You might also want to select from any of the following questions that would be appropriate to the story you selected.

Ask questions such:

- Ask “How do you think _____ felt when _____
- What do we know about _____
- What don’t we know about _____
- Where does this story take place?
- What are the life circumstances of the people in this story?
- What do you think God / Jesus is trying to teach those in the story?
- What do you think God is trying to teach us though this story?
- What did you learn from this story that you did not know before?

- How has this story made an impact on you?
- Did God speak to you in a special way through this story?
- If you were _____ in this story, what would you have done or how might you have reacted

Share the following with the workshop group:

Asking the right questions can help the entire group discover the truth God has for them. Every Bible story can speak differently to each person according to their background, knowledge, needs, life circumstance, etc. Never assume you know the story “point” they need to take from that story. Sometimes God will use a story to speak very uniquely to one person in the storytelling session from all others present.

In **Story Discovery** try not to ask questions that have a "yes" or "no" answer. Ask questions that dig into the story setting, the characters in the story, where the story characters are spiritually in their relationship to God, what we know and don't know about the story characters, etc.

8. Bible storying (chronological) approach: In the Bible storying approach the stories are told chronologically to help the listener not only learn the stories of the Bible but also to gain an understanding to the relationship each story to the stories before and the stories that follow. God is at work in mankind from

right there in the room where they had gathered and the disciples now knew for sure that Jesus had come back to life.

In the book of beginnings, Genesis 3:15 tells us of a promise. That promise says that Jesus would one day conquer over Satan's plan. Satan did not want Christ to be resurrected. When Jesus was crucified and died, Satan thought he had won his battle with God and that Jesus was now destroyed. But when God raised Jesus from the dead this was proof that God had final power over Satan. Christ had made the full payment for sin for all mankind and had conquered death.

Story Questions and Discussion:

- Why do you think the disciples were so confused?
- What might these happenings have meant to the religious leaders that spearheaded having Christ crucified?
- How might these events have impacted their religious leadership?
- Why was Christ's resurrection important in God's entire plan?
- What might you think was Pilate's reaction to this news?

taken Jesus' body away and she did not know where they had taken Him.

Then Mary turned around and looked and even though it was Jesus she did not recognize Him. She thought He was the gardener who took care of the graveyard. Then Jesus said to her, *"Why are you crying?"* She answered, (thinking He was the gardener) *"...if you have carried Him away, tell me where you have put Him."*

Then Jesus just said her name, *"Mary."* At once she knew exactly that this was Jesus, the Messiah and she responded, *"Teacher!"*

Mary was so excited she ran and told the disciples she had seen the Lord and that she had talked with Him. She told Simon Peter and John, *"The Lord is not there. I found the stone rolled away."*

Peter and John raced to the tomb and saw for themselves and then returned to the city to tell the others that Jesus had come back to life.

There was talk all over Jerusalem that Jesus' body was gone from the tomb. Some people said He had come back to life like He said He would and others said His body had been stolen so that people would think He came back to life. People were very confused.

When the other disciples heard that Jesus was no longer in the tomb they shut themselves into a room out of fear that people would say they had stolen Jesus' body. They all wondered where Jesus had gone. Then a few days later Jesus appeared to them

Genesis through Revelation and up to today. It is a never-ending story of God and how He is involved in all our lives. Read Romans 1:20

You want your listeners to not only hear the stories but to learn the stories so they can become teller of the story and stories themselves.

In this storytelling approach each time you have a storytelling session you always review on or two stories from past learning sessions. Select volunteers from the group and ask them to tell a prior story and ALWAYS after the story is told have the group respond and check to make sure this story was told correctly. This does not have to be an embarrassing or threatening time. God expects us to "get His story straight" and therefore we must be accountable to one another as we tell His story.

You have now completed the basic storytelling workshop. Now, learn and go tell His story to others.

Storytelling Ideas

Telling the scripture stories can be an exciting, interactive involvement with the audience. Consider some of the following techniques to have some creative features to the storytelling or scripture presentation time whether as part of congregational worship or in teaching and telling situations.

- **Chants:** Make up chants that go along with a story and have the audience repeat the chant.

Example: David and Goliath

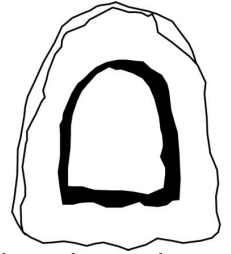
When you hear me say "David" section 1 says "He was young but brave" (and places hand over heart)

When you hear me say "Goliath" section 2 says, "He was a fearless warrior and he was strong" (and make a fist in the air)

Jesus Conquerors Death and Satan

Scripture: John 20:1-18, Genesis 3:15



When you read the Bible you find there are many verses in the Old Testament that mention about Jesus, the Messiah, one day coming to earth. Some of the Old Testament verses or prophecies were written 700 years before Jesus was even born. Yet all these prophecies came true; Jesus was born in Bethlehem, Jesus came riding into Jerusalem on a donkey, Jesus was crucified, Jesus rose from the dead after three days. All things written about Him hundreds of years before Jesus ever came to earth happened just like the Bible stated they would. These are all proof verses that Jesus was the Son of God.

Now Mary Magdalene was a woman who had been possessed by many demons. She previously had the demons cast out and was grateful to Jesus and His disciples for the freedom she now had. After Jesus was crucified and buried, Mary, in mourning, went to the tomb to remember Jesus who had done so much for her.

It was three days after Jesus died that Mary went to the place where Jesus was buried. When she got there she was surprised to find the stone rolled away and to find Jesus was no longer in the tomb. Mary thought someone had taken Jesus' body and she was so disturbed she began to cry. While Mary stood there crying she saw two men surrounded by bright light. She was so confused she did not even know they were angels. They asked her why she was crying and Mary told them that someone had

When you hear me say “Philistines” Section 3 stand up and shouts, “We fear no one.”

- **Pantomime:** Let other story team members pantomime the story as you tell it.
- **Illustrating the Story:** Consider using paper cutting illustrations as you tell a story.
- **Audience Action:** Have the audience do an action. Split the audience and have one side raise their arms and be the waves in the lake when Jesus was asleep in the boat with His disciples. Have the other half be the waves on the other side of the boat. They all raise their hands and wave them back and forth at the appropriate time as you tell the story.
- **Puppet Story Presentation:** Use puppets to tell the story or have puppets pantomime the story while one person or player tells the story.
- **Freeze Frame Storytelling:** Use team members from your storytelling group. Develop the story into sections and develop a scene for each section. Pre-train the players of each scene. If possible, have a curtain on a pole that is raised from the floor between each “freeze” scene. As the story is told have two people raise the curtain between scenes as players form each “frozen in place” scene. If a curtain is not possible, have the audience close their eyes between scenes as players reset themselves.

Example: The Good Samaritan

- Scene 1: Freeze frame – One player - Traveler on road
- Scene 2: Freeze frame – Four players -Traveler and three robbers
- Scene 3: Freeze frame – One player - Travel lying along road side

Scene 4: Freeze frame – 2 players - Traveler asks Priest for help
 Scene 5: Freeze frame – 2 players - Traveler asks Levite for help
 Scene 6: Freeze frame – 2 players - Traveler gets help from Samaritan
 Scene 7: Freeze frame – 3 players - Samaritan with traveler at inn
 Scene 8: Freeze Frame – 3 players - Priest, Levite, Samaritan

- **Shadow Story:** Use a white cloth and light in back shining on players that act out the story or use silhouette figures and scene props cut out from card stock and glued on thin dowel sticks (available from Wal-Mart or craft stores to make and props).
- **Storytelling line:** In this presentation style the story is told in scripture narrative form. The narrator and all the characters in the story stand in a line with their backs to the audience. They turn and face the audience only while speaking their story parts and when finished turn back around. If two characters are talking to each other, those two turn and face the audience for their parts but then “exit” the stage by turning back around.

Variation: In the story of creation you can have six characters and a narrator. The narrator begins telling and then each person, in turn, turns around to the audience and tells about their assigned day of creation. But – at the end of each day of creation have ALL characters turn and face the audience and say "And God saw all that He had made that day and it was good. And the evening and morning were the ____ day". Then they turn back around.

God. In addition, God needed to make this a true gift, something that man did not earn or deserve yet a gift man could accept by his own choice. This offer of a restored love relationship with God would not be by mandate.

When Jesus said on the cross at His last breath, “*It is finished,*” those words opened up heaven and eternity for anyone who would accept this gift by faith, confess their need for this gift and redemption, and enter into a restored relationship with God.

In a world of endless spiritual pain others seek this type of relationship with their god and this can never be achieved. In false faiths no one on their own can ever be “good enough,” or say enough prayers or do enough good deeds or give enough money. The living God not made of wood or stone has already completed the plan. The Gift, the greatest Gift of all the ages is right in front of us for the receiving.

later Christ would come to earth to offer redemption for mankind and at the same time Satan would be making his strategic moves to thwart God's plan. God warned Satan in Genesis 3:14, 15 that though Satan would strike the offspring of woman (Christ) that Christ would crush him. (And He did with the resurrection)

While all this was happening God had already planned the greatest gift for mankind before the world was created. It was all part of God's plan so that no matter what happened to man, eventually mankind would be able to be spiritually restored with God and become part of the heavenly kingdom in eternal worship and fellowship. God created man to worship and honor his Creator and a rebellious army of angels would not destroy that plan. That gift is a gift that man can never earn. That gift of mercy and grace would be God giving His only begotten Son, Christ, to take on Himself the sin of all mankind and be the perfect sacrifice, the perfect offering for all the ages past, present and to come.

God sent His Son to earth, to be both God and man, to be perfect and without sin and therefore to be also the perfect gift from a loving

The Bible Can Be Trusted

Scripture: 2 Timothy 3:16, 2 Kings 21:19-26

2 Kings 22: 1-13

In the book of 2 Kings, Chapter 21 and 22 we read a fascinating account of a changed life of not only a king, but the entire people in the kingdom of Israel. After several generations of rule by evil kings, a young boy, Josiah, just eight years old, became king of Israel. His father and his grandfather before him had fallen away from serving God and had not only disregarded God's law and permitted idol worship; they both participated in evil consulting with witches and sorcerers and sacrificing children to idols. But out of this evil and spiritually corrupt family heritage this young boy, Josiah, came to the throne. He began ruling with fairness and justice, but a reign empty of God's favor as the law of God had long been forgotten.

Then ten years later, at age twenty six Josiah decided to restore the temple that had been neglected for years. When the project began a worker found a copy of the scriptures of God that had been sealed away in a temple closet. The scrolls were brought to Josiah and when he had it read, it revealed the sin that all of Israel had been committing by disregarding the laws and worship of God. Not only did King Josiah fall on his face and humble himself before God in repentance, the revealed Word of God

changed Josiah's entire thinking and relationship with God and the way he would rule over the people of Israel. He then had the scripture writings of God read to all the people in open court. Everyone repented and returned to a right worship and relationship with God. Israel, as a nation, was spiritually restored. Read the story in 2 Kings 22. It demonstrates the power of just reading or hearing the Bible.

This story is an example of information that was received by people and trusted as truth. The most important issue with any religious book is this, "*Can the information be trusted?*" Think about it. Of the many books written, especially history, sometimes years later information comes to light that indicates blatant errors or misinformation.

At Mesa Verde National Park in Colorado the guides mention that recent major fires have uncovered literally thousands of previously unknown Anasazi Native American sites. Artifacts uncovered by the fires contradicted many earlier "facts" that were written in the Anasazi history. New information had invalidated the prior. It is important for every person to research to discover truth and not just take as truth what someone has said, written and published, no matter the writer's level of education or supposed authority to speak for God.

were with Him when people began to look for Him because they wanted to kill Him. They were with Him when most of the people turned against Him and when He died a terrible death on a cross. And after He had gone to heaven, they faced opposition by people who were suspicious of their faith in God and His son Jesus even after Jesus was no longer right there with Him. They could not control any of these things. But Jesus had prepared them by teaching them ahead of time to trust in God. Jesus was always there ready to rescue them, especially from themselves.

- Why do you suppose after all the time the disciples spent with Christ up to this point, in the time of crisis they did not first turn to Him?

how out of control the disciples felt as the boat was rocked by the wind and they were drenched by the waves. The storm was so terrible they thought they were going to drown.

What about Jesus? Surprisingly, Jesus had gone to sleep in the boat, and on a pillow no less. He didn't get up even when the storm was at its worst. Terrified, His followers woke Him up, shouting "*Teacher, don't you care about us? We're going to drown! Save us!*" So Jesus got up. Amazingly, when He told the wind and the waves to be still, the wind died down, the waves subsided and complete calm descended over the lake. Then Jesus asked His followers why they were so afraid, "*Do you still have no faith?*"

It is interesting that Jesus had been teaching His followers and the people about the meaning of faith. One thing He said was that we should not worry about life. We cannot see God, but God knows all about us. He knows we need food and clothing. He also knows we need Him when life becomes difficult and even frightening. Jesus' followers were literally out at sea without an anchor. They need not only physical but spiritual rescue. They reacted at first with fear when something happened that they could not control even though Jesus was right there with them. But, then they realized Jesus was with them and that He would know what to do. The answer to their question "*don't you care about us?*" was "*Yes!*" This happened when they recognized that "*Surely, this Man is (really) the Son of God as even the wind and waves obey Him!*"

We know by studying history and the Bible that the followers of Jesus were being prepared for even more difficult times. They

The Bible, as a religious book of faith information, is different from any other book ever written. After years of the most intense scrutiny by the most educated researchers, here is the final scoop; Bible information has NEVER been proven to be inaccurate. If anything, continued archeological discoveries reveal and confirm more and more the accuracy of biblical writing. This is especially important as the Bible is compared to other religious books.

Moses is the first person mentioned in the Bible as writing anything and by genealogy tracing it can be documented that he lived around 1500 B.C. Moses is also held by Jewish historians as being the author of the first five books of the Bible. Other biblical writers and God Himself supports this authorship in later Bible passages.

There are two parts of the Bible, the Old Testament and the New Testament. The Old Testament is essentially the history of the beginning of all creation and is the earlier story of God's people. The New Testament is about the life of Christ, the beginning of the Christian church plus a description of Heaven, the end of this world, and the new world to come.

Altogether there are 66 small books in the Bible, 39 Old Testament books and 27 New Testament books. God used 40 different men to write the books of the entire Bible and they did

not all live at the same time. The entire Bible writing covers a span of 1,600 years. One of the greatest verifying facts of the accuracy of the Bible is this, though some writers lived hundreds of years before another writer, in many places in the Bible what a biblical writer stated was going to happen in the future, happened hundreds of years later. That is proof of something incredibly different about this book, the Bible, since only God who inspired the writers could have known that something stated that was going to happen, would happen.

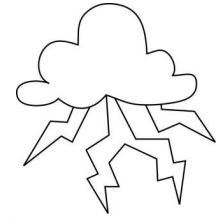
Of all the books ever written, all other books were written by a person except for this one book, the Bible. Men whom God inspired to write makes God the actual author of this book. (Research 2 Timothy 3:16, Matthew 4:4, 2 Peter 1:20, Hebrews 4:12)

When original biblical writings were transcribed by hand and copied over and over, early scribes checked and rechecked every stroke of the pen to make sure the words never changed during this process, thus preserving the accuracy of biblical writings. In A.D. 90 an official council of Jewish leaders put their seal of approval on the Old Testament books that had been accepted for the prior 500 years as being the accurate writings from God. That council of religious leaders confirmed those books as final and complete. The New Testament books were made official (canonized) around 90 A.D. after John wrote the last book.

Studies of human behavior show that when we feel we have control over circumstances in our lives we are less stressed. When we feel we cannot control events around us we are the most stressed. It was a long day for Jesus and His followers. By the time Jesus had finished teaching it was evening. It is a book about God the Holy Spirit , His Son, Jesus, and information God intended for everyone to have in order to know Him and know His love for mankind. It is a book that tells the way for every man, woman and child to have a direct relationship with Him as a living, accessible God of acceptance and love, not a god of wood or stone. This book, the Bible, and the stories within have the power to change a person and also alter the course of man while journeying through life.

The Bible is how God communicates with us today; inviting us to personally know the Creator of the universe and how all mankind are unique creations for God's special purpose and plan. 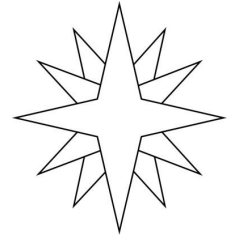

Many years before Christ was born God had promised the Messiah, His Son, Jesus, would come to earth. In the story of Adam and Eve God had to kill animals and make clothes for Adam and Eve as part of taking care of what happened when they disobeyed and sinned. From that time on animal sacrifices were a reminder to God's people of their sin and how much God loved them and was ready to forgive them.

During the Old Testament times God had made a way for people to have their sin covered by making sacrifices of animals and birds at the temple. The blood from the sacrificed animals was a symbol of the way God would forgive sin. For many years this was how sin was forgiven. But God had promised that one day He would send His Son, Jesus, to earth to become the once and for all time completed sacrifice for sin so that the Old Testament system of sacrifice would no longer have to be performed. In the New Testament we read that one day an angel came to a young girl named Mary and told her that she would be the mother of God's Son. We believe that the Bible is trustworthy and true. We do not have the time and space right now to discuss this particular topic, but suffice it to say that the bible has been proved right time and again with regards to what is written in its pages. And so we go to the Bible to understand how it all began.

The Bible does not tell us every detail about creation. Yet what we learn about creation from its pages is astonishing but simple, compelling but understandable. It is here that we first see how the world began, and the special place every one of us has in the eyes of God.

We read in Genesis, the first book of the Bible, that God has always existed. He has always been there. Before there was earth, moon or stars, or even time God was there. The physical universe that we inhabit, including how we view time, was created by God. We live in a world of day and night and seasons, but with God we are told that one day is just like 1000 years and 1000 years is just like one day. And for reasons that only God knows, He decided to create this universe, our world and humankind. As we read how it all came into being, we see several things.

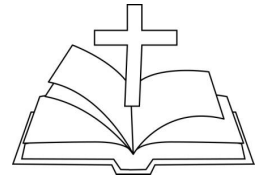
We see that God is immense. We are often awestruck by the complexity and vastness of just our planet and solar system, yet it is part of a universe that is so big, scientists really have no idea of its extent. The test of a true prophet of God was whether or not what they said came true 100% of the time. There was no allowance made for what they said not being 100%

bird and fish as well. There is nothing that you can see that God did not create.

We also see in the creation account that God is a loving God who intimately cares about each of us. He took six days to create all things and was pleased with what He made. He did not make any mistakes. We read that each day after He surveyed all He had made, he said to himself, *"This is good!"*

But He saved his masterpiece for last. Mankind was the last thing He created. He created Adam and Eve different from all other living things. They were made in God's image. 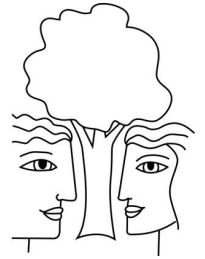

Look at your fingertips, all ten fingerprints are the same. Amazingly every person's fingerprint is different from every other person in the world.

(Genesis 2:7) And God named him Adam and he was different from everything else God had created. God's own breath was not breathed into fish or birds. God only put His breath into humans.

After God created Adam, God saw that Adam was lonely and needed someone like himself to talk to and be with. So God put Adam into a deep sleep and took one of Adam's ribs and from that God created a woman, Eve, to be his companion. I am sure they also both had fingerprints that were different from each other even though Eve was made from one of Adam's bones.

The garden where Adam and Eve lived was a perfect place. God provided everything they needed and gave them all the food they would ever need. But in the center of that garden was one tree that God said they could not eat from. That tree was called the tree of knowledge and the Lord God commanded them, *"You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die."*(Genesis 2:16-17)

But there was also something else in that garden that was not so perfect and that was the evil serpent, Satan. He had a plan to deceive Adam and Eve into disobeying God.

God and said – *"Who am I that anyone would listen to me? I am not anyone special."* God encouraged Moses and said, *"I will be with you!"*

God also told Moses that at first Pharaoh would not let the people go and He would punish Pharaoh and the Egyptians so they would know who the true God was. Moses was to be assured that Pharaoh would eventually let them leave. But this situation had some complications.

Back to the game plan. Moses had yet a further conversation with God and started to give many excuses as to why he should not be the one to go to Pharaoh. Interesting, isn't it? Not unlike us when we have a pretty good idea of something we should do and begin rationalizing our way out. Moses just did not see himself as anyone extraordinary and that Pharaoh would listen to him.

Moses never thought he would have an extraordinary future. Well, at least not when he was a child. But God already had an extraordinary plan in mind for him, much different than Moses could ever imagine. And Moses would have no idea of that plan for many years.

When Moses became an adult he had left Pharaoh's palace, married within his Jewish nationality, became a shepherd and took care of his father-in-law's sheep. Nice life. He was happy with what he was doing; he was happy with his life and Moses continued being an everyday, ordinary country shepherd for many years. The extraordinary did not yet happen.

Life moved on and when Moses was 80 years old and out in the meadow with the sheep, he saw a bush burning in flames. He went over to the bush to investigate and the Bible describes as he went closer to the flaming bush he noticed the bush was not being consumed. Then a voice called to Moses from the burning bush. It was God speaking. Moses fell on his face before God.

God told Moses He heard the cries of suffering of the Hebrew people who were living in Egypt under the very cruel rule of now a different Pharaoh. God said He was going to do something extraordinary to help the Hebrew people, to rescue them. Then God added something Moses never expected. God told Moses he was the man chosen to help lead the Hebrews out of Egypt and that Moses should go to Pharaoh and tell Pharaoh to let the Hebrew people leave.

But wait a minute. Moses was 80 years old. He was no leader, he was an ordinary shepherd. So, pressing the issue, he questioned

One day Eve was walking past that tree that God said they should not eat the fruit and the serpent called to Eve and started talking to her about the beautiful garden. As the serpent, Satan, kept talking to Eve he pretended to notice the fruit tree and told Eve how delicious the fruit looked. Then he suggested that maybe Eve should try some because it looked so good. Eve knew the rule and said she and Adam were not allowed to eat the fruit from that tree or they would die.

Then the serpent told Eve the biggest lie ever told. He told Eve that what God said was not true. He told Eve if she ate that fruit she would not die but that she and Adam would be just like God and that they would know wonderful things that they never knew before.

Eve thought about what the serpent said and believed what he told her, she believed the lie. So Eve picked some of the fruit and she ate it. When she did, she now understood new things so she quickly took some of the fruit, told Adam about what the serpent had said and gave some of the fruit to Adam and he took the fruit and he also ate it. Once they both ate the fruit, they recognized that they were naked and they were ashamed. They experienced the guilt of sin; rebellion against God.

When God came to the garden, as He did almost every day to walk and talk with Adam and Eve, He could not find them where they usually met. So God called to them. Adam and Eve were hiding in the shrubs because now they knew they had disobeyed God. They finally came out from where they were and God asked them why they were hiding. Then they told God they were hiding

because they had no clothes and were naked and they were afraid.

Then God asked them if they disobeyed and ate the fruit He told them not to eat? Adam blamed Eve. He told God Eve gave him some of the fruit and he ate it. Then God looked at Eve and Eve blamed the serpent Satan. She told God the serpent told her to eat it and she did. It was the blame game. Adam and Eve never said to God they were sorry for disobeying. God was disappointed that Adam and Eve had disobeyed.

Because Adam and Eve disobeyed, God put them out of the garden, their perfect world, forever. God did this because there was another tree in the garden, which was called the tree of life and Adam and Eve could no longer be allowed to eat from that tree, because now their bodies would get old and someday they would die, just like God said they would.

The perfect world was not perfect any more. Like Adam and Eve we also fail God. With disobedience comes separation from God. God gives us freedom and the ability to know right from wrong and also the opportunity to have our relationship with Him restored.

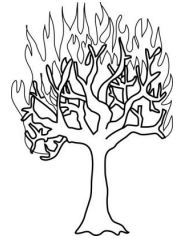

Ordinary People

Scripture: Exodus 3:1-4:18



Have you ever wondered what a famous person or maybe a person who accomplished some very unusual feat might have been like as a child?

What might they have been like before their accomplishment or rise to a prominent position? Chances are they were just an ordinary child that climbed trees, rode a bike or a little girl that played with dolls and had a puppy for a pet. There is a fascinating story in the Bible of such an ordinary person from the Old Testament that God used in an extraordinary way to fulfill His plan for His people.

When Moses was a boy the Israelites were in a desperate situation. God's rescue plan for them required an extraordinary and courageous leader. Years before this rescue was going to be needed God already knew how things were going to work out and knew exactly who He would use to work out His plan.

If you remember the Bible story of Moses' birth and being found at the river's edge by Pharaoh's daughter, that is just the beginning of such an incredible plan that God already had in mind years before the rescue would take place. Now as a child Moses had no idea that God had a plan for him when he would become an adult. Moses was just a boy from an ordinary Jewish family, raised in Pharaoh's palace and also by God's provision raised by his own mother who taught Moses to obey and worship the living God.

really what God wanted him to do, Abraham obeyed by setting out for the journey the following morning with Isaac and his servants. When they arrived at the mountain Abraham asked his servants to stay behind while he and Isaac went up to worship God. On an interesting note, when he left his servants Abraham made the statement to them, “*When we return*”, indicating to the reader somehow God was going to work out this looming disaster. Arriving at the top Abraham built an altar and tied up Isaac to prepare him as the sacrifice exactly as God had instructed. Then Abraham raised his knife but God called out, “*Abraham, Abraham, do not lay a hand on the boy.*”

God was pleased with Abraham’s faith that he would not hold out his only son Isaac. Then Abraham and Isaac heard a noise and in the bushes nearby there was a ram. God had provided the ram as a replacement for the sacrifice. (also a picture story of the eventual coming Messiah)

God repeated His blessing on Abraham because of his faith and trust and fulfilled His promise through him for a family larger in number than the stars of the heavens. Years later Isaac grew up, married and had many children and his children had many children and they had many children and years later there was so many descendants of Abraham that they were as the stars of the sky and the grains of sand on the beach, so many you could not count them. This was the very beginning of the Jewish people.

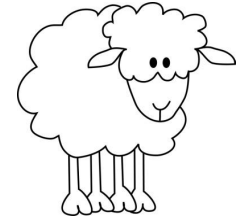

Test of Faith

Scripture: Genesis 21:1-19; 22:1-14



The story of Abraham is one of the most interesting stories of faith in the Old Testament. Abraham was a loyal follower of God with unwavering faith. He and his wife trusted God but there came a time when God wanted to test Abraham's faith and trust.

In the times of the Old Testament it was not uncommon on specific occasions God would speak directly to people.
